The Orchestra

An orchestra is a large group of players who are organized into four families or sections: strings, woodwinds, brass and percussion. They are led by a conductor who stands in front of the players.

PERCUSSION
WOODWINDS
BRASS
STRINGS

Features the orchestra by tapping right hand or left hand one of the families of instruments.

You can return to this page any time by tapping on the 'Home' button.

Strings

The string section of the orchestra is made up of violins, violas, cellos and double basses which all have to sit upright or lie down to make a sound. The harp also sits with the string players and it's played by plucking the strings.

Double bass, Violin, Viola, Harp, Cello, Double bass

Tap the images to hear the instruments.

The conductor

The conductor stands at the front of the orchestra so that all the players can see and hear. The conductor uses his or her hands and arms to give the players instructions.

Flute and piccolo

The flute is the only member of the woodwind family that's not made of wood! The piccolo is about half the size of the flute and sounds higher.

Flute facts

Wooden flutes were made from animal bones, including swan, buffalo and porcupine bone.

We flute is used in many different types of music including jazz, folk and orchestras.

A person who plays the flute is called a flautist.

Can you identify the instruments' names in the sound clips? Tap on the instrument you think made the sound.

Writing music – page 27

1. Hear a motif - tap on the star to hear the motif from Beethoven's 5th Symphony and tap on the image to find out the note names e.g. quavers
2. Make a motif - drag the notes to re-write Beethoven's motif
3. Play a motif – choose an instrument to play the motif
